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FROM THE CHAIR & CEO



Never has the Committee's role been more important than it is now as we sit at the crossroads of change in how we live, interact and work in a world disrupted by the COVID-19 pandemic and other global forces of change.

Following a year's worth of research on changes to work, the workplace and workforce, the Committee released the final report arising from the *Future of Work* major research project. Through this project, we achieved our aim of building a comprehensive understanding of how technology and automation combined with relevant global and workforce megatrends are shaping the future of work in Greater Peth and WA.

The *Future of Work* project has been the most dynamic research we have undertaken to date. Our starting point was to generate a significant body of knowledge with which to analyse, consult, articulate and socialise the likely impacts of the disruptive forces at play. Key inputs into this research included seven *FACTBase Bulletins*, one large-scale community and business survey and numerous member workshops and socialisation sessions with members and stakeholders.

The final report *The Future of Work: Equipping WA and its people to lead the Nation in the future world of work*, outlines five key findings and two scenarios, and makes 22 recommendations to position WA and Australia more broadly at the forefront of the future of work revolution.

A key finding of *The Future of Work* report is that access to skilled people and human capital in Greater Perth and WA has been in comparative decline. As a result, the State and region are not well-positioned to support the jobs of the future. This finding has informed our next major research project, *Race to the Top*, which is already well underway and will continue into next year.

The purpose of *Race to the Top* is to address immediate labour and skill shortages and prepare the workforce to meet industry demand over the next five years.



Aside from our major research projects, we undertook two projects with Business News. The first is a seven-volume publication, *Promoting Perth*, a series dedicated to talking Greater Perth up and showcasing all that it has to offer—a key recommendation from our *Boorloo Kworp 'Perth is Good'* report. The second is a podcast series that brings leaders from our membership together to talk about all things Perth, including the economy; diversity; change and development; perceptions of Perth; and the 2,000+ generations of know-how the region may draw upon.

Since the pandemic hit, we have gone digital with a suite of webinars, and now podcasts, which will remain part of our ways of engagement with members to shape the future of Perth as well as conduct face-to-face events.

Throughout the year, we held two *Food for Thought Leaders Luncheon series: COVID Recovery & Resilience* and the *Future of Work*. Both series offered insights into how different sectors are reacting to the challenges brought about by the pandemic and how the forces of change are affecting how and where we are working.

We were also pleased to hold several *Chairman's 20* events for our Gold and Silver members, at which we heard from speakers including the Hon. John Carey MLA; John Langoulant AO; Dr Richard Walley OAM; and Ed Kalajzic, CEO of Western Power.

Our *Annual Chairman's Luncheon* in June was our milestone event for 2021, at which we celebrated 15 years in operation and presented the results of the *2021 Perth Perception Survey*, the fourth in the longitudinal series.

We held several *Executive Women's Leadership Forums*, our signature event series for senior and executive-level women in the Committee's membership to meet throughout the year to hear from other female leaders about their career and life journeys.

In terms of online activities, in 2021 we continued to run our popular *New Horizons* and *FACTBase Talks* webinars, open to all employees of our member organisations, where we heard from guest speakers on many relevant and apropos topics, and where the Committee's members had the opportunity to hear exclusively from our researchers the day before the *FACTBase Bulletins* were released.

All the initiatives aforementioned were available at no cost as part of the annual membership fee. We also started a new webinar series *Lunch & Learn* to release our major research pieces.

Our Reshaping Working Group has provided invaluable feedback throughout the year on issues such as medium density policy; the viability of trackless tram technology as a suitable 'mid-tier' public transport solution for Perth and the related Public Transport Authority's position paper; the Kings Park and Botanic Garden management plan 2021–2026; the City of Cockburn's Aboriginal Cultural and Visitors Centre project; the draft State Planning Policy 2.9 Planning for Water (SPP 2.9) and draft Planning for Water Guidelines; and the Beam mobility as a micro-mobility option for the Perth Region.

We continue to welcome new members, and we are fortunate to have over 115 member organisations who represent 40 plus sectors in WA's economy.

2022 is shaping up to be an exciting year for the Committee as we progress full steam ahead with a rich calendar of in-person and online events, along with a dynamic research agenda.

The *Race to the Top* research will keep us busy as we work towards a deadline of delivering the final report by September 2022. We will also continue our advocacy concerning *The Future of Work* and will conduct a series of roundtable discussions with members on flexible work, climate change and skills shortages.



OUR 2021–2022 MAJOR PROJECT—RACE TO THE TOP

In September this year, the Committee commenced its 2021–2022 major project, *Race to the Top*, informed by the findings of *The Future of Work* report.

About the *Race to the Top* Project

Meeting current and future workforce needs is one of the biggest challenges facing many WA businesses. *Race to the Top* is a research project to position the workforce to meet current and future industry skill demand over the next five years. The urgency of preparing the workforce cannot be underestimated, hence it is a race for industry, education providers and policymakers to deliver a ready workforce.



Our *Bigger and Better Beyond the Boom* and *Future of Work* research projects found that:

- Western Australia’s skilled, educated and creative people will be our most valuable future resource yet are in diminishing supply; and
- Greater Perth’s workforce is influenced by demographic change with an ageing population. Unless addressed, this may negatively impact on the workforce and the regional skill base.

One of the pressing issues facing WA’s employers over the next 12 months is how to access workers. There are two sources of labour supply: domestic and overseas.

Access to overseas workers is currently restricted due to international arrival caps, visa restrictions and difficulties associated with international travel. Even with international border restrictions due to ease for nationals over the coming months, there is unlikely to be an influx of overseas workers into the country. Understanding the migration system, and the concentration of migrant workers in specific occupations and industries, is important to finding solutions for the immediate period and over the next five years.

On the domestic front, access to workers within the State and interstate, is problematic as businesses compete to access skilled and experienced workers, resulting in a crowding-out effect for some sectors. This could be compounded over the five years with some industries forecast to experience high employment growth including health care and social assistance; mining; electricity, gas, water and waste services; education and training; accommodation and food services; and administration and support services.

Therefore, the knowledge of current sources of labour supply, including the factors that affect these sources, will be important to solving immediate skill shortages and future skill needs to ensure industry growth can be supported by the State’s workforce.

In addition to addressing immediate labour and skill shortages, preparing the workforce to meet demand over the next five years will be important as a lack of suitable workers will hamper development and economic growth. The role of education and training in delivering a fit-for-purpose domestic workforce over the next five years, and the role of migration in filling skill and labour demands are some of the important considerations for workforce planning.

OUR 2020–2021 MAJOR PROJECT—FUTURE OF WORK

During 2020–2021, the Committee conducted a research project focused on equipping WA and its people for the changing world of work. Against a backdrop of global headwinds and the COVID-19 pandemic, we sought to identify the ways in which work, the workplace and the workforce will change and adapt over the coming decades.

Our starting point was to generate a significant body of knowledge with which to analyse, consult, articulate and socialise the likely impacts of the disruptive forces at play. Key inputs of this research include seven *FACTBase Bulletins*, one large-scale community and business survey and numerous member socialisation sessions.

The final report, *The Future of Work: Equipping WA and its people to lead the Nation in the future world of work*, arising from the *Future of Work* project, provides a comprehensive understanding of how technology and automation combined with relevant global megatrends are shaping the future of work. The report outlines five key findings and two scenarios and makes 22 recommendations to position WA and Australia more broadly at the forefront of the future of work revolution.




